

AN OVERVIEW OF OUR PROGRESS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDED 12/31/'04

his past year we distributed 52 grants totaling \$1,952,195, not including Trustees' discretionary grants, which brings the total to over \$2 million. The average grant was \$37,542. Grants ranged from \$125,000 to as little as \$4,695. Moreover, there were 59 additional inquiries where we have invited them to submit an application, and another 78 inquiries where, for one reason or another, we did not invite them to submit an application. So, '04 marks the first year that the deal-flow reached a satisfactory level. It was also Mary's first year as a full-time employee which was certainly a major factor in getting the volume up to speed.

It has been 31 months since our benefactor died. Initially, in the first 19 months after he passed away, we labored with a considerable amount of inertia marked by a woefully inadequate deal-flow which necessitated my selling our grants like life insurance which I never would have dreamed to be necessary in the business of giving away money. Fortunately, that era is now well behind us, and we're now up to speed.

Bob Raynolds and Mary have created what appears to be the most advanced electronic processing system in our industry. Many of the foundations Mary has visited have been around a lot longer than 1772, and they are still pushing papers around, but they all want to convert to our system. In any event we are definitely on the cutting edge in grant processing. Moreover, this methodology has enabled us to keep our costs well below most other foundations of comparable size.

We have had considerable success in developing cluster areas around places like Charleston, Savannah, San Francisco and Seattle. More recently, we have discovered that even less populated areas like Maine lend themselves to the cluster concept which enables us to provide better, more efficient oversight.

While we're off to a good start, for '05 we should work up to an average of \$700,000 or \$750,000 per quarterly meeting to be in compliance with IRS mandates. This year we will also need to do some more site re-visits to let people know we're keeping an eye on things. The Board has been very helpful in assisting Mary with site visits, and I thank you all for those efforts which I know are time-consuming.

On the investment side, we seem to be in pretty decent shape, although, like everyone else, we could use some more income. Whatever happened to 6% yields? The three money managers are holding cash positions of 75%, 40% and 27% respectively, so we're in a good position to take advantage of opportunities when they present themselves.





- The 1772 Foundation gave \$1,952,195 in grants for historic preservation from January 1, 2004-December 31, 2004.
- Another \$50,000 in discretionary grants was given by board members.
- Grants were given to 52 organizations in 16 states.
- Grants ranged from \$4,695 (Portsmouth Athenaeum in New Hampshire) to \$125,000 (Middleton Place in Charleston, South Carolina.)
- The average (mean) grant was \$37,542.21. Median \$35,000; mode \$50,000.
- The top ten grants totaled \$829,000, representing 42% of the total given.
- New Jersey received the most grant dollars, \$357,500, while Maine received the largest number (8) of funded projects.


